Course Description

This graduate seminar examines the role of energy in international politics with a particular emphasis on the link between energy and national security policy. The seminar explores the historical use of energy resources as a geopolitical tool, and highlights the strategic aspects of energy in the contemporary security environment. The seminar has three main objectives: The first is to critically examine the implementation of energy statecraft in the post WWII era with an eye towards identifying energy policy principles. The second is to project what role energy statecraft will play in China's pursuit of the Third Revolution. The final objective of the seminar is to put forward energy policy proposals aimed at addressing twenty-first century challenges. Throughout the semester students will construct an analytical framework to evaluate and assess the utility of energy statecraft. Guest lecturers from both government and the private sector will supplement class discussions and course materials to offer policy perspectives and provide career advice.

Weekly Policy Memos and Class Participation (20%)

Students must email weekly policy memos by <u>12:00 on the Monday prior to class</u>. The memo should be <u>no more than 2 pages</u> and must briefly identify and discuss key elements of the weekly reading assignment such as the primary actors, their objectives, resources, strategies, policies, and outcomes. Each memo should summarize and put forth broader "lessons learned" that were gleaned from the readings. Reading assignments are listed on the syllabus the day they will be discussed in class. Each student is expected to complete the required readings and be prepared to participate actively in discussions.

Group Presentations and Policy Memos (50%) There will be two group presentations. Each presentation must be accompanied by a policy memo, which is <u>limited to 4 pages</u>, and due by email <u>12:00 on the Monday prior to class</u>.

Group Presentation and Policy Memo #1: Energy Statecraft in the Post-WWII Era

Group presentation #1 will address the following question: *How was energy leveraged* as a geopolitical tool during the post-WWII era? The memo should conclude with a list of policy principles that were derived from week 1 - 4 lectures and readings. The policy memo and presentation are **due September 10, 2018**.

Group Presentation and Policy Memo #2: The Role of Energy in China's Third Revolution

Group presentation #2 will address the following question: *What role will energy statecraft play in China's* 3^{rd} *Revolution?* The memo should conclude with a list of policy principles that were derived from week 6 – 9 lectures and readings. The policy memo and presentation are **due October 22, 2018**.

Final Presentation and Policy Memo (30%) Energy Statecraft in the 21st Century

The final presentation and policy memo will address the following question: *What role will energy statecraft play in the twenty-first century*? The memo should conclude with a list of policy principles that were derived from week 1 - 13 lectures and readings. The final presentation is **due November 13, 2018.** The final policy memo is <u>limited to 5 pages</u> and is **due by email November 26, 2018.**
