Dissertation: The Political Activities of U.S. Courts of Appeals Judges

Vining, & Teena Wilhelm In three articles, my dissertation takes a novel look at federal appellate judges by examining the political activities and experiences they bring to the bench. Article 1, Tracking and Explaining Politically Active U.S. Courts of Appeals Judges, develops novel data and indicators of political activity from judicial questionnaires. The article then describes the variation in the political activities of federal appellate judges and examines which factors help explain when politically active judges are selected to the bench. Article 2, The Differential Use of Political Language by Judicial Nominees, theorizes and tests how factors such as political environment and a nominee's past career experiences influence the use of political language during the nomination process via automated, dictionary-based text analysis. Article 3, The Effects of Prior Political Activities on Judicial Decision-Making combines the novel political activity data and an original database of U.S. Courts of Appeals cases to examine whether the selection of more politically active judges affects judicial decision-making.
