Course description

This course aims to introduce students to the foundations and organization of American government. First, we will cover the beginnings of American government through examining the Constitution and the challenges faced by the Founders. For the next part of the course, we will learn about the formal institutions in American government and the interaction between these branches. We will then broaden our definition of government institutions and consider the role of informal institutions (media, political parties and interest groups). Finally, we will look at how the electorate responds to and fits into the American system of government. Throughout the course, we'll also cover similar topics related to Georgia state government.

Course objectives

- Study the origins and workings of American government
- Analyze American government, considering democratic ideals
- Develop a working knowledge of current events in American politics
- Improve critical thinking and communication skills by considering various political perspectives, reflecting on the development of personal views, and communicating those views effectively

Assignments and grading

Discussion section (10%)

Discussion sections occur every Monday and attendance is mandatory. More than one unexcused absence will result in reduction of the student's discussion section grade. The discussion section grade may also include reading quizzes and short assignments.

Midterm exams (20% each, 60% total)

Students will take three exams throughout the semester. Each midterm exam will be non-cumulative, only covering recent material. If a student knows they will miss an exam on the assigned date, they must contact their TA or course instructor prior to the exam to schedule a make-up exam. In order to make up an exam due to illness, documentation from a physician must be provided.

Final exam (30%)

This exam will be cumulative, covering material for all readings and lectures throughout the semester.²

Engagement assignments (extra credit)

I encourage you to be engaged with political news throughout the semester. It should provide a richer experience with the course material and may establish news reading habits. There will be opportunities to gain extra credit throughout the semester by sharing/presenting political news with the class.

Attendance notes

Your attendance is expected and appreciated in this course. You benefit from attending class, and I benefit when you attend class. I look forward to seeing you every Tuesday and Thursday. The same is true for discussion sections on Monday. Obviously, things come up. Open communication is always appreciated and considered. However, your TAs notes when you are not in class, and this factors into your grade.

Students are expected to behave professionally and cordially throughout the course. Disruptive behavior will not be tolerated, and students engaging in disruptive behavior will be asked to leave. This includes cell phone usage, excessive talking, and derogatory or offensive comments made during class or discussion section.

 $^{^2}$ The final exam is optional. If students are happy with their previous exam grades, they can choose to have each exam count 30% instead of 20% and opt out of the final exam.
