Course description

This course aims to introduce students to the foundations and organization of American government through service-learning.

Course objectives

- Study the origins and workings of American government
- Analyze American government, considering democratic ideals
- Develop a working knowledge of current events in American politics
- Learn the course material by working individually and as a team through servicelearning
- Improve critical thinking and communication skills by considering various political perspectives, reflecting on the development of personal views, and communicating those views effectively

Georgia Politics in a State of Change (2nd Edition), Charles S. Bullock and Ronald Gaddie.

Assignments and grading

Attendance and participation (20%)

I take attendance every class mostly so I learn students names but also to have a record of absences. It's important to attend class for your own benefit. Additionally, your peers and instructor value your presence as well. You are allowed two unexcused absences, no questions asked. However, after two absences, I begin to deduct points from your attendance and participation grade. If you are not present, you cannot participate. If you have doctor's notes, you can send them my way for excused absences.

Short online quizzes (6% each, 30% total, lowest grade dropped)

There will be 6 quizzes with the lowest quiz score dropped. The final quiz grade includes 5 quizzes, each counting 6%. Students will complete the quizzes individually via eLC and outside of class. However, students will take the quiz during our normal class time, lasting 30 minutes on the assigned day. Anything from the class material is considered fair game to show up on the quizzes, and students may use their books and notes. Each quiz is non-cumulative, only covering recent material.

Service-learning reflection (2 short, 5% each; final, 10%; 20% total)

Reflection is a critical component of service-learning. Students will be asked to do this individually, by responding to a written prompt, and collectively, through class discussion. Each individual will complete 2 short written reflections, and one longer final written reflection. The three shorter written reflections will be due the week after service-learning projects are due.

Service-learning assignments (10% each, 30% total)

Students will work in small groups (2 or 3) for these assignments. These service-learning activities will take place during the course of the semester. There will be time set aside for group work in-class and sometimes out of class. The targeted audience for our service-learning includes University of Georgia students. Our focus is voter education. More details to come!

ELearning

Students must become acquainted with eLearning Commons for this class (https://uga.view.usg.edu/). Sign into eLC using your UGA Myld and password. If registered for the class, the course link should show up on the student's eLC homepage. Significant content will be available via eLC. Students must check in to eLC multiple times a week.
