Course Description

This course is designed to provide a comprehensive overview of politics in the South from the pre-civil rights era to the present. Students will be exposed to detailed information and materials relating to black disenfranchisement, [re]enfranchisement and mobilization; social and economic changes in the region; political party transformation; the role of religion in political matters; and the effects of redistricting and reapportionment on political outcomes. After completing this course students should have a firm grasp of the political changes that have occurred in the region over the last fifty years, as well as a clear picture of the current political situation.
