Course Description

This course shall provide students with the information necessary for developing a broad understanding of the structure, processes and functions of the American government. To this end, we shall examine the origins, development, and functions of the three branches of government: the executive, legislative, and judicial branches. In addition to discussing how the branches of government function independently, we shall also discuss how the branches of government interact with one another within the seperation of powers system. Finally, the course shall also discuss the roles of federalism, institutions, state and local government, public opinion, political parties, the media, elections, and voting behavior within the American political system.

Course Goals: The primary goal of this course is to provide students with the tools they need for understanding and critically evaluating the political information widely disseminated by politicians, pundits, friends and family, social media, and the mass media. If we accomplish our goal, by the end of the semester students will be discerning consumers of political information, and they will know how to participate in the political process if they so choose.
