Course Description:

This course is designed to introduce students to the institutions and processes of American national government, and the state of Georgia. Over the course of the semester, we will examine explanations of how our political system operates and how well it meets its democratic aspirations. The purpose of the course is to promote learning and critical thinking about U.S. politics that goes beyond much of what we hear and read in the news, social media, and everyday conversation. One of my primary goals then is to have you reevaluate commonly held assumptions and criticisms of the American political system. In some instances, what you learn will run counter to commonly held views about American government (regardless of your political beliefs). We will also focus on many basics of U.S. government that are not well known or understood (e.g., the Electoral College). Lastly, we will cover the Georgia constitution and political system.

This course applies to Area V Social Sciences requirements of UGA's General Education Curriculum. It also satisfies the USG graduation requirements for demonstrating knowledge of both the U.S. and Georgia Constitutions.

Class Website:

The class will be administered through the eLC website and you will use it to submit assignments, take quizzes, and to receive class announcements. My primary means of communication with you will be through announcements posted in eLC so be sure to check *frequently* (at least daily). Courseware:

We will be using **Top Hat** for class participation (both lecture and discussion sections). You will be able to submit answers to in-class questions using Apple or Android smartphones and tablets, laptops, or through text message. Hat account during the lecture either through your laptop or your phone. Our class is called "POLS1101 Fall 2026 Prof. Nicholson." I will provide the join code during our first day of class. There is an additional Top Hat course for your breakout section. Your TA will provide the join code for that course in your first breakout session. Professor Nicholson or your teaching assistant will not be able to help with technical issues.

Course Requirements:

To complete the course successfully, students are required to take weekly online quizzes, three in-class exams, and regularly participate in breakout section. Students will apply theoretical frameworks, including political values and democratic theories, to analyze the organization and functioning of American government, its political institutions, and processes. The purpose of the quizzes and exams is to assess student understanding of the structure and operation of the American political system and demonstrate knowledge of the central theories, approaches, and findings.

Lecture Participation and Extra Credit:

Students should attend class regularly and, ideally, have read the material before class. Given the large amount of material we will cover, it is important to not get behind or miss class. If you anticipate missing more than a few classes or are unable to keep up with the reading, please drop the class. Although class slides will be available to you during and after class, students who attend class typically receive higher grades. If you care about your grade, come to class!

Students who attend class and participate will receive extra credit (up to 2 percentage points of your final grade!). Using Top Hat, I will periodically ask questions to gauge student learning or opinions. Each time you answer a question, you receive extra credit. The extra credit is added to your final grade *at the end of the semester*. Since in-class participation points are extra credit, there are no opportunities to make up missed points due to absence (regardless of why you missed class).

Students are also expected to be courteous. Please do not eat, sleep, read, arrive late to, or leave during, class time (if you must leave early, please sit in the back row and exit discretely). Do not text, surf the web, or otherwise do anything on your phone, tablet, or computer that is not class related. Other than answering class questions with the Top Hat app, students are not to be on their phones during class.

Breakout Section:

You are required to regularly attend the breakout session you are enrolled in (attendance will be taken). One of the learning outcomes associated with the breakout sessions is for students to demonstrate an ability to engage in informed, respectful discussion that are associated with multiple points of view.

Please identify your section and your Teaching Assistant (TA) by checking your class schedule. This is an important step since your TA is responsible for leading the breakout session and grades. Attendance in breakout session is mandatory and part of your grade. Your TA will discuss expectations with you. All breakout sessions are on Friday.

Grading

The final grade is made up of weekly chapter quizzes (open book/note), three in-class exams (two midterms and a final), and breakout section participation. The weekly chapter quizzes are worth 15%, the in-class exams are worth 25% each, and participation in discussion section is worth 10%. Although the third exam is held during finals week, it will be non-cumulative and be worth the same amount as the other in-class exams. For the in-class exams you will need a blue (or green) book, scantron sheet 882, a #2 pencil, and a blue or black ink pen. The blue book and scantron sheets are available on the second floor of the bookstore. *Weekly quizzes need to be completed no later than midnight on Thursday, the night before discussion section.*

Grades will be assigned according to the following scale:
